IN MEMORY OF MY DEAR SWIRRD, JOHN MCKINNEY

John McKinney was born August 4, 1877, Caswell County, North Carolina, at the farm on which he lived when he died, July 30, 1937, age 60, lacking 3 days.

Mr. McKinney leaves a good wife and eight fine boys and girls: Mrs. James Smith, Greensboro; Mrs. Nathaniel Hadd, Burlington; Vergil and Raleigh McKinney of Burlington; Haley, Luther, Hassel, and Pauline, at home.

Two children preceded Mr. McKinney to the grave. Mr. McKinney is also survived by one brother, Bill McKinney, and three sisters: Mrs. A. H. Oakley, Yanceyville; Mrs. W. E. Byrd, Yanceyville; and Mrs. Jack Black of Gibsonville, N. C.

John went to the hospital on July 20. From his conversations with folks and friends he did not believe he could live through the operation.

I helped him through about the day before he went to the hospital and he told me the wheat could never do him any good, and I felt that it wouldn't at the time. (How useful is the wheat of losing a good neighbor.)

I went to see him Sunday before he died on Friday. He was feeling good, I thought. Little did I think I had bade him good-bye for the last time.

I was working near his home when he the word came that John could not live much longer. I looked out at his good home with tears in my eyes and said: "Oh John, how can we live without you?" I hurried to his bedside and found his good family around his bed crying and praying, I imagine for his recovery.

John was never united with any church but believed only in Salvation by Grace as preached by the Primitive Baptist Church.

I lived less than a mile of John all my live, 49 years; and I never lived by a better neighbor and friend. I can't recall of ever hearing him use an oath and neither one of his children.

John had a good family for which we give him and his wife credit.

Two Negroes, Fleeing Danville Police, and Two White Farmers Fatally Injured in Spectacular Collision of Auto and Truck at Hogan's Creek Bridge

A five-gallon can of liquor with which Charlie Fitzgerald and Tick Pass, negroes, attempted to escape from Danville police, last night, was blamed for the deaths of both. And of two white men, in a spectacular crash at Hogan's Creek bridge on the Yanceyville highway, a few miles south of the North Carolina border, shortly after three o'clock yesterday afternoon.

John Y. Chandler, and Joseph W. Dabbs, Caswell county farmers, died at Memorial hospital, where they were rushed in a Swicegood ambulance, an hour after being admitted. Their heads were crushed and their bodies mutilated.

Fitzgerald, driver of the car which fled from a police machine operated by Officers J. D. Davis and John W. Wilson, was killed instantly. Pass lived a short while after being removed to Providence hospital. Their heads also were crushed, and their bodies horribly mangled.

To Hold Double Funeral

A double funeral for Mr. Chandler and Mr. Dabbs will be conducted at Bush Arbor Church, ten miles beyond Yanceyville, Monday afternoon at 2:30 o'clock.

The police officers picked up the trail of Fitzgerald's car, in the rear of which they said they saw a five-gallon can which they suspected contained liquor, as it emerged through an alley leading from Brucetown, where Fitzgerald lived, into West Main street, opposite Danville Community hospital.

They overtook the car at what is known is Dowdytown, on the Yanceyville highway, after a chase through heavy traffic to the outskirts of the city, and drew the police car alongside that of the fleeing negroes. Officer Davis is said to have drew his revolver and shot down a rear tire. The shot was fired, the police said, between Gus Dowdy's store, and C. A. Frazier's filling station.

Running on the rim, the police said,
