Bartlett Yancey High School has been accepted and approved as an institution for the training of teachers. Two student teachers will begin work here on March 29 and will work through May 26. Jessie Hughes of Burlington will be teaching Business Education under the supervision of Mrs. Blanche F. Page. Terry Cox of Ramseur will be teaching Junior English under the supervision of Mr. Robert Barham. Both student teachers are doing their undergraduate work at Elon College. This training is a part of their preparation for careers in teaching.

The first week or two they will be observing the supervising teacher at work. Later they will take over part of the teaching of the class. Before the end of their work they will be expected to be teaching all of the regular program of work.

Due to the shortage of teachers, it is the duty and responsibility of schools to help prepare and encourage students to enter the profession of teaching. Presently a Future Teachers of America Club is part of our school activity. The actual training of teachers placed here by colleges will be a second step in the same direction.

"NASA SPACEMOBILE"

Did you know that the world's first astronaut was a Chinese scholar by the name of Wan Ho? Or that the first liquid rocket was launched in America in 1926 and that English might well be the most important subject a future scientist or engineer should master?

Information of this sort will be revealed when the NASA Spacemobile arrives at B.Y.H.S. to present a space science demonstration on March 26.

The Spacemobile itself is actually a panel truck of conventional size. It does not, as the word implies, travel out in space.

What makes it different from other vehicles is its cargo. The Spacemobile is filled with scale models of rockets and satellites, mechanical and electronic equipment.

One can see models of Tiros, Syncom, Alouette, Ranger, and the OSO. A look into the future is afforded with the models of Nimbus, OAO, OGO, Surveyor, Gemini, and Apollo.

The Spacemobile is not used for exhibit purposes, but is presented as a lecture-demonstration. These demonstrations are given by experienced science educators who are authoritatively informed on the activities of the National Aeronautics and Space Administration.

A typical lecture of about 50 minutes covers such subjects as the history of rocketry, propulsion, biological aspects of space flight, orbits, electrical requirements, and man's responsibility in the Space Age.

By utilizing models, the lecturer will discuss the NASA programs in the areas of communication and weather, scientific exploration, and unmanned and manned space flight.

SAINT PATRICK'S DAY

Saint Patrick's feast day falls on March 17. It is celebrated by Irish People all over the world. In New York and Boston, where a large number of people are of Irish descent, there is a parade every Saint Patrick's Day. The Point System

The Point System is a new set up intended for the purpose of taking heavy loads off students who find themselves "caught up" in responsible, time-consuming positions in too many clubs, organizations and activities. The Book Shelf

Reference books serve as time savers and short cuts in acquiring information and are one of the most efficient means of locating desired materials in a minimum of time. There is no other place where you will find so much information as well organized and as carefully indexed. Because reference books represent the accumulation of facts or bits of information, they are not intended to be read from "cover to cover;" but are kept in the library at all times for the use of everyone.

When one uses a reference book, he will save himself time and mental confusion if he will note and remember the following:

1. The title of the reference book
2. Copyright date
3. Frequency of publication
4. Kind of information treated
5. Arrangement of materials (alphabetical or by large subject)
6. Location of index
7. Key to abbreviations
8. The use of illustrations

Unless one remembers the title of the reference book used and the nature of its contents, much time will be lost later in locating similar materials. A few minutes spent in examining different reference books will be worthwhile for anyone who has a minimum of time to spend in searching for information.

In every library, there is an important group of books known as the reference collection. These books ordinarily contain condensed information relating to general or specific topics or words, as well as maps and statistics. Dictionaries, encyclopedias, books of quotations, biographies, and bibliographies are in this collection.
